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Reason: We are losing opportunities when many of our competitors accept ITINs. In 2015, more than 4.4 million ITIN holders paid \$23.6 billion in taxes. Most commercial companies accept it. Since ITINs were not issued until July 1996, it was not on the radar for fraternals. The American Fraternal Alliance by-laws leave it up to the state.
